RE: Prioritize Funding for Community Resilience Hubs in 2021-22 State Budget

Dear Speaker Rendon, Pro Tem Atkins, Assemblymember Ting, Assemblymember Bloom, Senator Skinner, and Senator Wieckowski,

On behalf of the Asian Pacific Environmental Network, California Environmental Justice Alliance, and the undersigned organizations, we respectfully write to urge to request priority funding for community resilience hubs that enables investment in the construction and rehabilitation of neighborhood-based community facilities to address the growing needs of working class communities of color in the face of the converging climate, economic, public health crises.

Community resilience hubs are spaces where communities gather, organize, and access social services not only during disasters, but on a daily basis. The transformation of trusted community spaces into resilience hubs ensures that those most impacted by climate change have access to critical services to cope with ongoing and future climate disasters in the immediate term while simultaneously stabilizing communities for the long haul. The specified investments would collectively enable community-driven building and property upgrades in order to provide integrated delivery of emergency response services including clean backup power, clean air respite, cooling, food storage and distribution, shelter, economic assistance, internet services, and other public health measures.

Our groups support a holistic approach in the creation of community resilience centers at neighborhood-based institutions. Given the unprecedented budget surplus, we would like to see increased funding for frontline-led solutions that enable everyday economic, health, and social resilience in addition to crisis response during climate disasters.

We specifically urge you to consider the following requests:

- Direct additional \$350M for a SGC grant program that supports the construction and rehabilitation of community facilities (complementing CDFA and CalOES approach in May Revise)
- Allocate \$500M for the CPUC EJ Community Resilience Hubs Program as proposed by AB 1087 (Chiu, 2021-22)

The Governor's May Revise proposal focuses on CDFA funding for fairground improvements and CalOES funding for community hardening. While these investments are important, on their own, they will fail to address key resiliency needs for our most underserved and vulnerable communities. Investments in resilience hubs can build ongoing economic, health, and social resilience alongside responding to climate disasters (e.g., extreme heat, wildfires, smoke waves, power shutoffs, and flooding).

It is time to change course: California must be proactive by scaling and resourcing community-driven solutions. Community resilience hubs make possible the simultaneous investment in a wide range of resilience upgrades including improved insulation for extreme heat protection, clean energy installations for backup power during grid outages, or air filtration systems to combat wildfire smoke. By enabling these improvements, this solution offers immense potential to achieve a multitude of economic, health, and social benefits for the communities who need it the most.

We respectfully ask for your support of this budget request.
