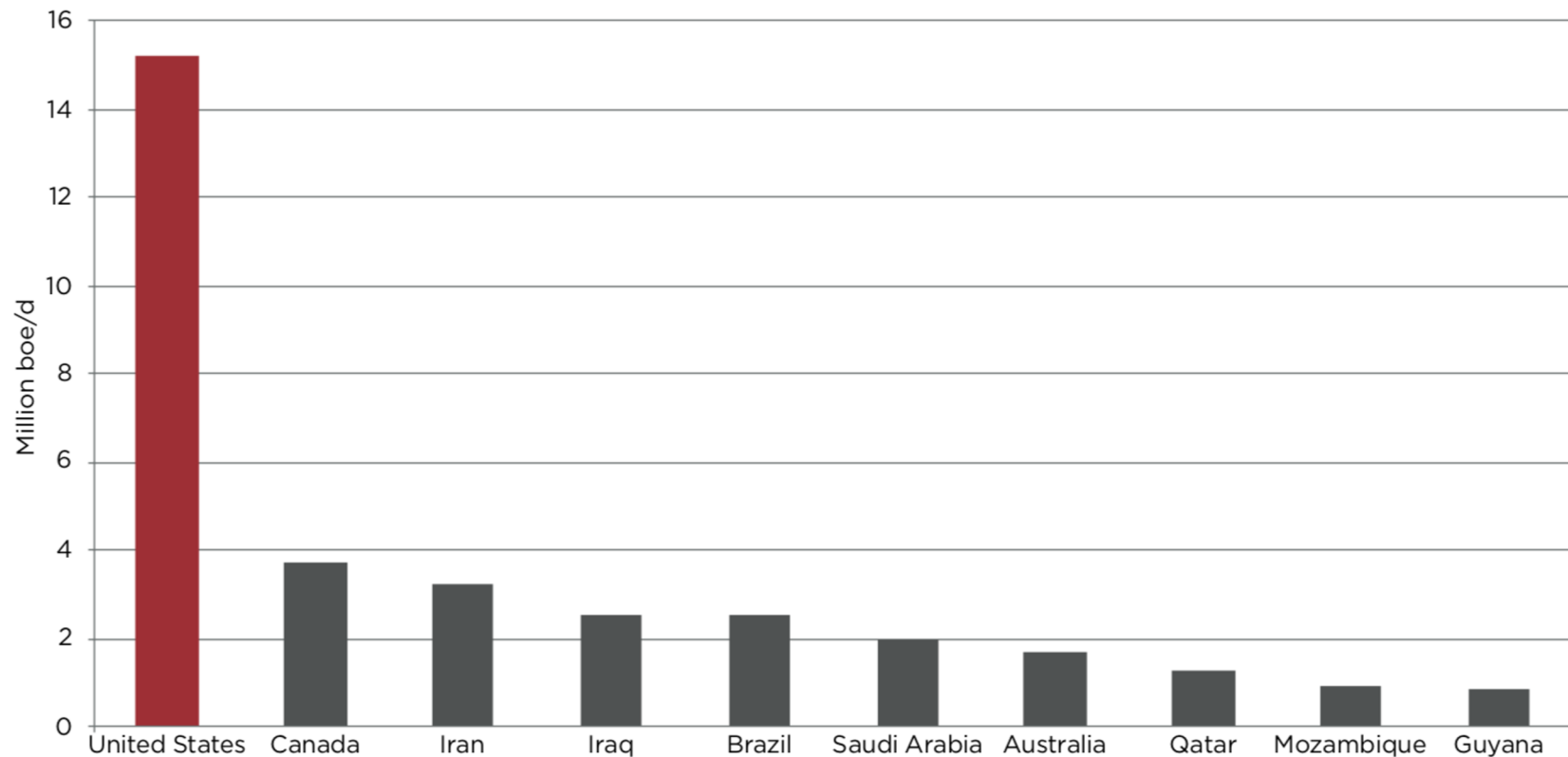
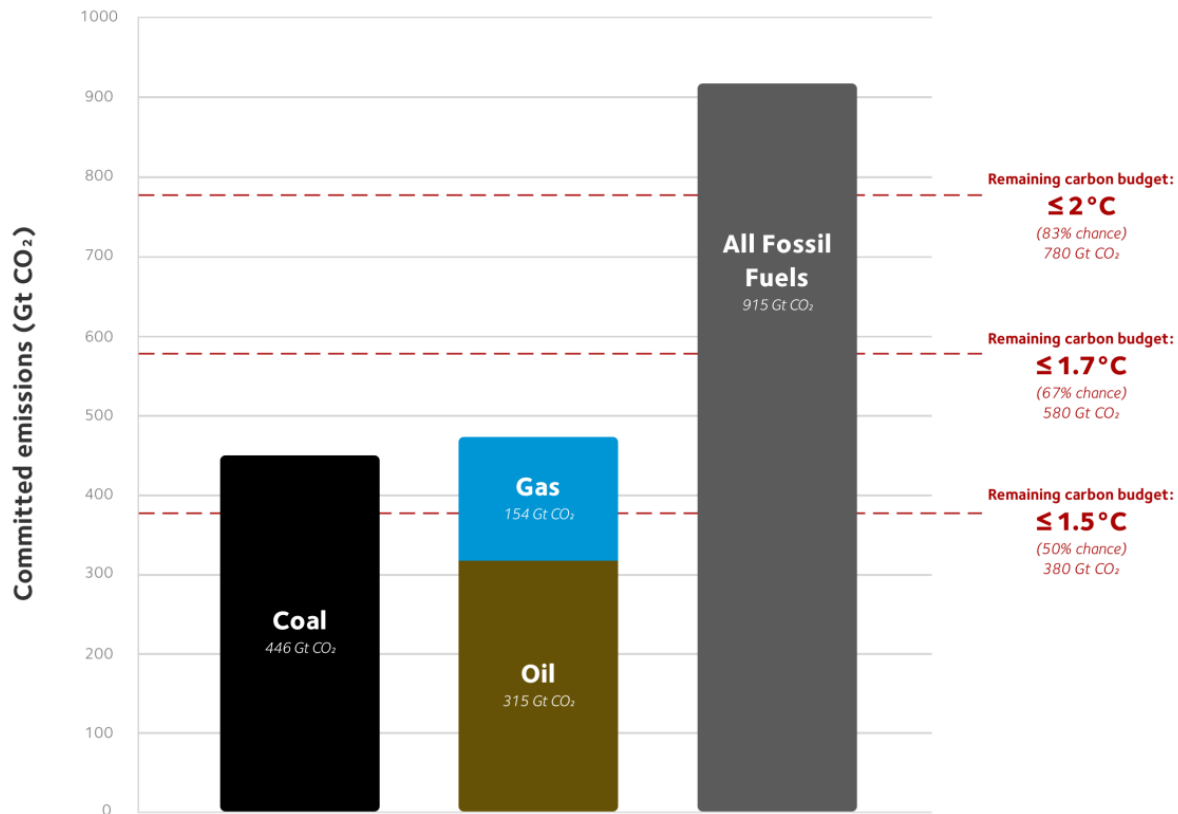


Figure 4: Top Countries by Increase in Oil and Gas Production to 2030 (over 2017 baseline)

Figure 1: CO2 emissions committed by developed oil and gas fields and coal mines, compared to remaining carbon budgets from the start of 2023

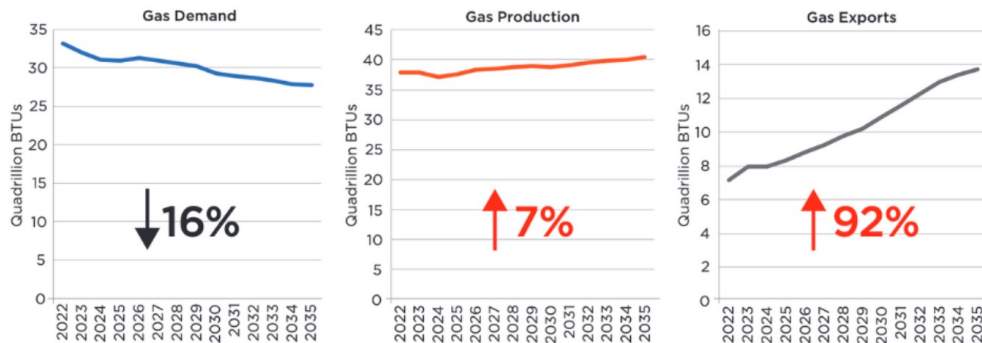

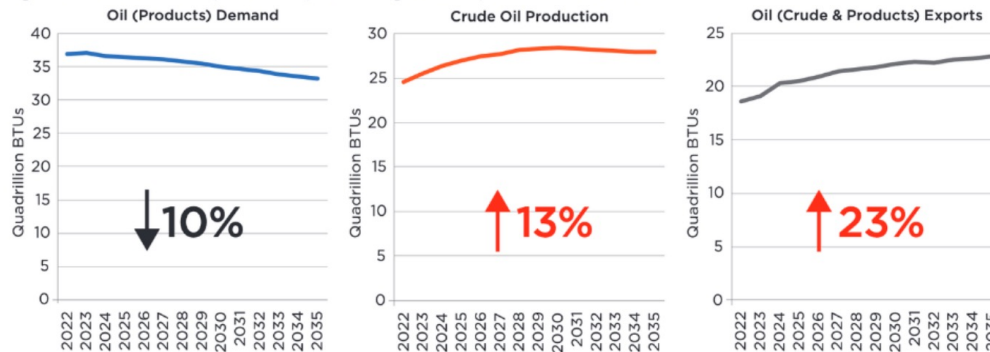
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Figure 2: Fossil Gas – Percentage Increase / Decrease 2022-2035
