What is community engagement?

...encompasses processes by which different groups are involved in making decisions that affect them



And why is it relevant for our discussion today?

A just, ethical negotiation on benefits requires involving affected and interested groups in broader project decision making

What community engagement is NOT

- Not PR or marketing
- Not (just) education or communication

Instead, purpose is to align a project with the priorities of the people it might affect

...who is the 'community' that should be involved?

- Potentially affected and interested groups + those with rights relevant to the broader project (area)

*important to actively prioritize accessibility + also be aware of established voices

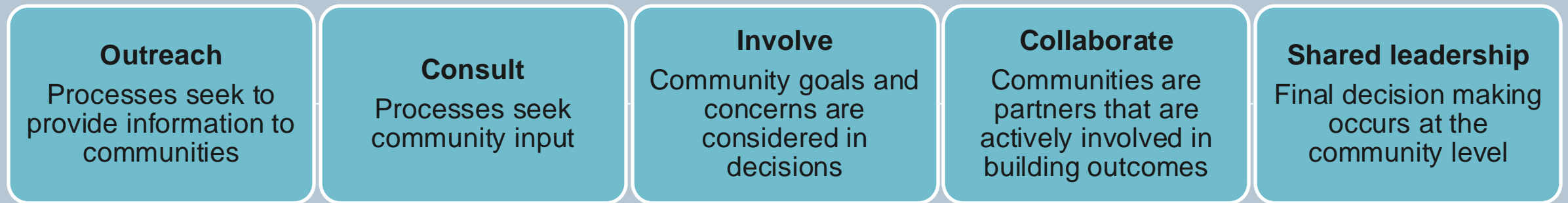

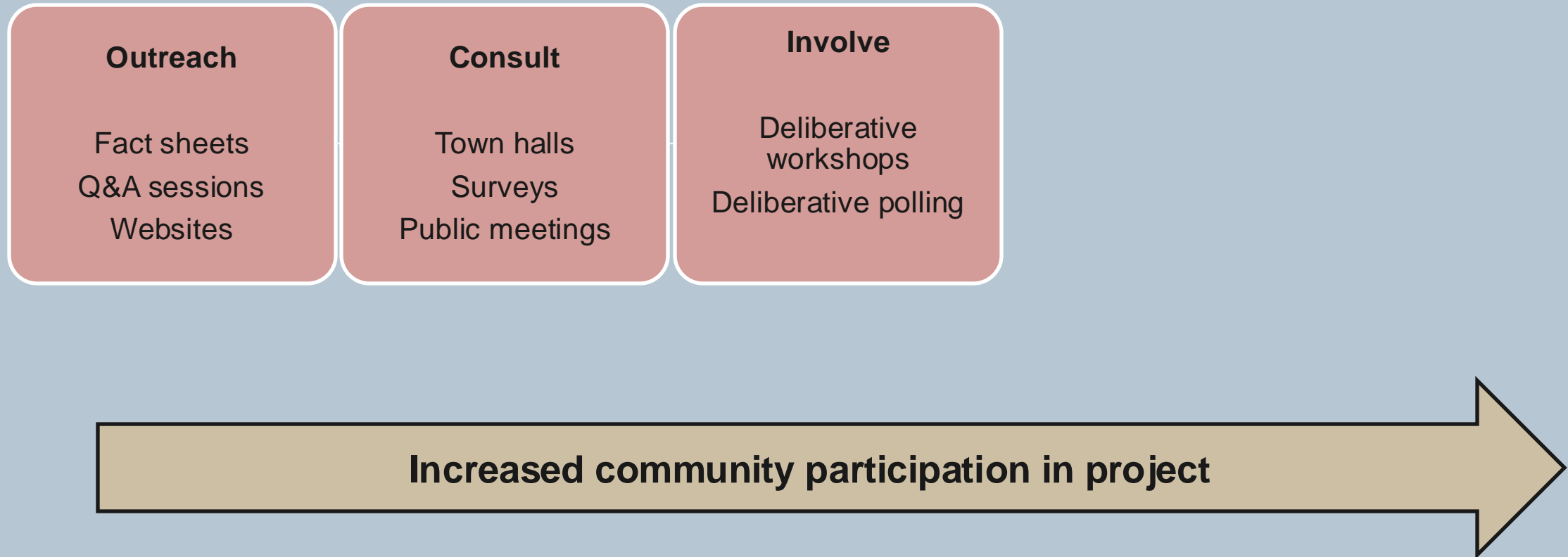

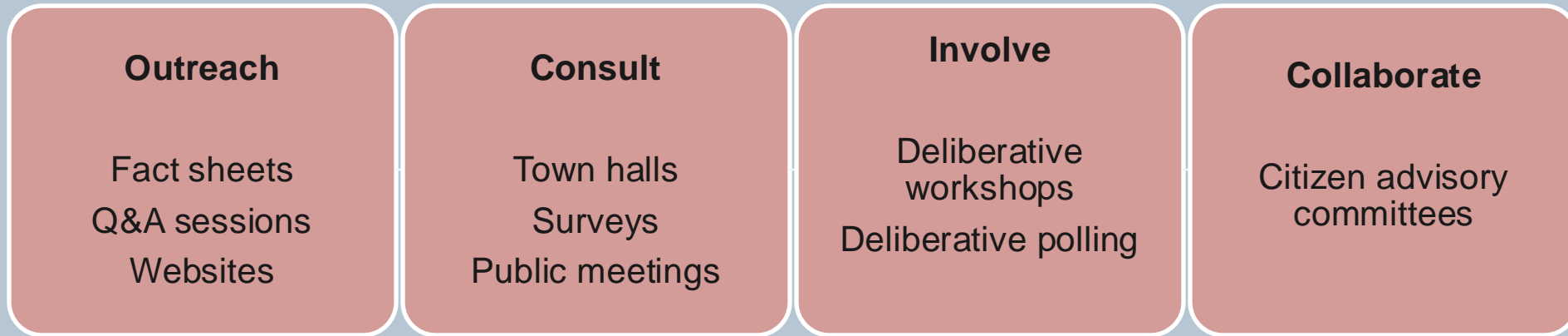

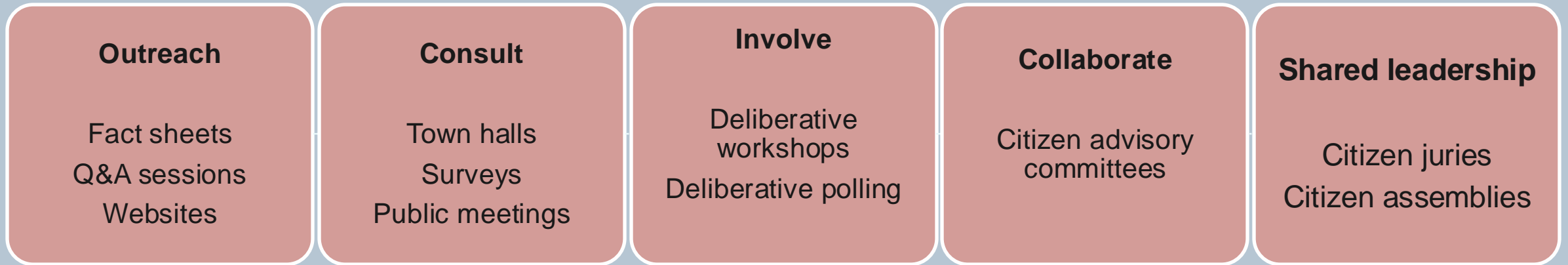

Engagement should go beyond discussing just 'yes or no' and potential benefits

Risks and benefits

Support or not

Conditions for acceptance/rejection?

Alternatives, other configurations?

Alignment with values & visions of the future?

Engagement must (transparently) shape project decisions

A 'no' MUST be an acceptable outcome
