Climate Superfund Can Help

Budget cuts threaten critical health & public services. The Superfund Act would provide a new source of revenue. Key budget impacts:

- **\$150 Billion or More in Revenue.**
- **Addresses Soaring Climate Costs:** LA fires cost an estimated \$275 billion. Without change, taxpayers will bear the costs while fossil fuel companies profit.
- **Reimbursing Taxpayers:** allows California to recover billions in expenditures tied to climate impacts.



Making Polluters Pay is Overwhelmingly Popular

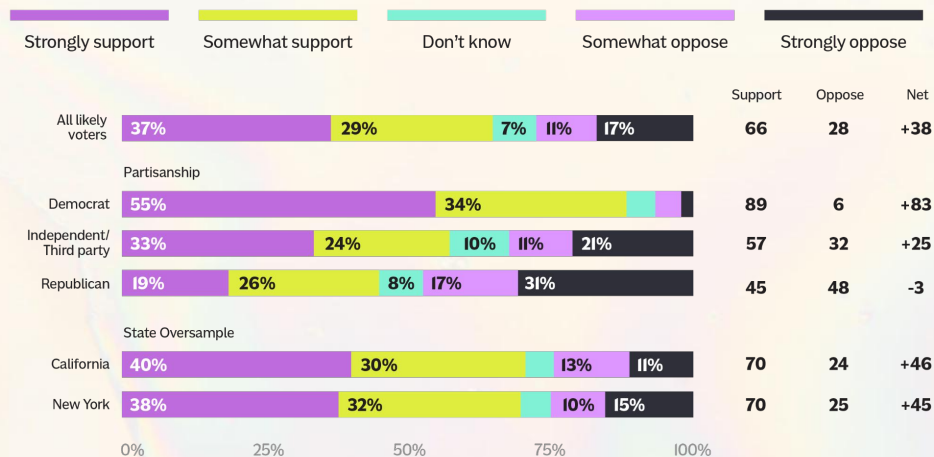
Californians strongly support making polluters pay.

- 70% of likely California voters support a Climate Superfund to hold fossil fuel companies accountable.
- 69% say they would be more likely to support a candidate who prioritizes this bill.
- Across party lines, voters agree: the public is ready for action.

Voters Strongly Support a Climate Superfund Bill

Some lawmakers are considering a “climate superfund” bill that would require oil and gas companies to pay a share of the cost of climate damages caused by their pollution.
